How to Run A Successful Meeting

Before the meeting starts you always want to have a plan of what the meeting will be about. For example:

- What is the purpose of the meeting?
- What are the desired outcomes or milestones?
- Is a meeting necessary?
- Who should attend the meeting?
- What is the meeting agenda and timeline?
- What preparatory work is needed?

Also you want to make sure that you have ground rules set before the meeting can begin. Some examples of ground rules are Start on time, stop on time, One conversation at a time, and all must contribute.

Once the meeting has begun you want to make sure that you have your meeting breakouts. Some examples of breakouts are:

- Explain why they are needed
- Have a clear process for forming breakout groups
- Provide clear instructions
- Provide clear deliverables and timeline
- USE the results

Here are some other ideas to include in your meeting:

- Document in a visible area
- Allow a few minutes of informal discussion at the meetings start

As you get close to the end of the meeting discussions you can do any of the following:

- What actions are needed and who is responsible?
- What decisions were made?
- What issues still need to be resolved?
- When is the next meeting and what is the agenda?
- Action plan for extraneous ideas
- Document and disseminate (minutes, team notes)

Call to Order

The meeting will come to order, (Rap gavel once.) _____ will lead us in the FBLA pledge.

Welcome and Introductions

Welcome to the November meeting of the Admiral Byrd Middle School Chapter of FBLA

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

The Secretary will read the minutes of the previous meeting.

(The President is seated while minutes are read.)

Are there any corrections to the minutes? (Pause)

(If none): The minutes stand approved as read.

(If correction): If there is no objection, the secretary will make the correction. Are there further corrections? (Pause) If not, the minutes stand approved as corrected.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer will now report

(The President is seated while report is read.)

Are there any questions? (pause)

The Treasurer's report will be filed.

Reports of Officers and Standing Committee Members (if appropriate)

May we have the report of the Social Committee?

(The President is seated while report is read.)

Unfinished Business

The next business in order is unfinished business.

(Review minutes of the last meeting to determine any unfinished business to be brought before the chapter. If there is no unfinished business, move to New Business without announcing the heading of Unfinished Business.)

Sample Agenda Continued

New Business

The next business in order is new business:

First of all, we will have a report from our special committee on the school service project. (The President is seated while report is read.)

It has been moved and seconded that we gather classroom trash cans and spray paint huskies on them. Is there any discussion? (pause for discussion; once it stops,)

Is there any further discussion?

If there is no further discussion, we will proceed with the vote. it has been moved and seconded that we gather classroom trash cans and spray paint huskies on them. All those in favor say "AYE." All of those opposed, say "No."

If it passes: The aye's have it and the motion is carried. Or

If it doesn't pass: The no's have it, and the motion is lost.

Is there any other new business?

Announcements

(Have list prepared)

Are there further announcements?

Program

The vice-president will present the program.

(Thank speaker, etc.)

Adjournment

Is there any further business? (pause)

Since there is no further business, the meeting is adjourned.

(Rap gavel once if desired)
